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Pavement Crack Sealing

What is crack sealing? How do we (the City) benefit from it? Crack sealing is used to fill individual pavement cracks to prevent entry of water or other substances such as sand, dirt, rocks, or weeds. According to Crafco, approximately 75% of non-treated cracks in asphalt pavement form into potholes within 3 years whereas approximately only 1% of treated cracks that have been sealed will form into potholes within 3 years. Crack sealing treatment can slow the rate of crack formation in pavements over time.

In recent studies sealing cracks in pavement (crack sealing) has proven to be the lowest cost pavement preservation treatment available by far. The next lowest cost pavement preservation is a single chip seal which is approximately 4 times more expensive. A dollar spent crack sealing returns more benefit than a dollar spent with other preservation treatments.

Decorative Devices at the Cemetery

The City is requesting that all decorative devices that are not a permanent part of the stone be removed as soon as possible. If they are not removed by December 1, 2023 city staff will remove them.

According to City Code 12-411 the cemetery board has the right to prevent the erection of any structure or other decorative device which it deems detrimental to the general appearance of the cemetery, or which would tend to hinder the proper care of the cemetery. (Ord 396, Sec 15)

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


Economic Development! Do you own a house or structure that you've been wanting to tear down?


The upcoming lagoon and wetlands project, scheduled to commence construction in late 2023 or early 2024, marks a significant milestone in our commitment to upgrading our wastewater infrastructure and provide for future growth in Marysville.

One of the primary aspects of this project involves the addition of a new lagoon cell to our wastewater treatment system. This expansion aims to increase our capacity to handle wastewater more efficiently as our city continues to grow. The new lagoon cell will ensure that the treatment process is not only effective but also environmentally conscious.

In addition to the new lagoon cell, the project includes the creation of a designated wetlands area. Wetlands are vital ecosystems that provide a host of ecological benefits, including water purification and wildlife habitat. By incorporating a wetlands area into our city's wastewater treatment, we are not only enhancing biodiversity but also contributing to the overall health and resilience of our environment. This wetlands area will serve as further filtration of the wastewater before the water is reintroduced to the ground water.

One of the most remarkable aspects of this initiative is the transition towards a non-discharging wastewater system. This shift represents a significant step forward in our efforts to minimize our impact on local water bodies and ecosystems. Instead of releasing treated wastewater into the nearby river, our upgraded system will recycle and repurpose water within the lagoon and wetlands. This innovation aligns with modern best practices for wastewater management.

The project will be constructed over the next year and will not interfere with current operations of the wastewater treatment.

<u>Change/Update Utility Account Holder</u> <u>Ordinance No 1893</u>

ARTICLE 1. Section 15-122 of the 2020 Code of the City of Marysville is amended to read as follows:(b) Change of Account Holder. Should the holder of a utility account die or leave permanently, the person still residing therein shall establish service under their name within 30 days of the triggering event.

- (1) In the case of a death, a spouse continuing to live at the residence shall be named as the account holder on the existing account without need for a service connection fee, but an account application is required.
- (2) In the case of the account holder permanently leaving the residence, the remaining resident shall make application for the utilities to change to a new account under their name. All requirements for service connection fees shall apply.
- (3) A triggering event shall include absence from the residence for 30 calendar days or death.
- (4) Should the sole account holder die, and the premises is inherited, rented or sold to another party a new account must be established for service.
